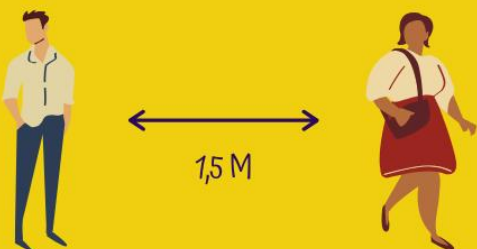


Keep your distance from others both indoors and out.

Cough and sneeze into your elbow.

By coughing and sneezing into your elbow or into a tissue you prevent droplets containing germs from spreading around you, or from contaminating your hands. Always put used tissues into the bin and wash your hands.



Respect the Right of Public Access when you spend time or stay overnight in the nature.

The Right of Public Access is a fantastic opportunity for all of us to roam freely in nature. It can be summed up with the phrase “Don’t disturb - don’t destroy”



Start a campfire safely.

Choose a place where there is no risk of the fire spreading and make sure that it is thoroughly extinguished. Do respect open fire bans that might be put in place by the authorities.

Limit your travels.

Try to stay in the same surroundings during your holidays in Sweden. Even if you only have slight cold-like symptoms, stay at your holiday home, in your motorhome or your tent and avoid to meet people.



Remember that special rules are applying regarding overnight stays in motorhomes.

Consideration is especially important when camping with caravans and motor homes outside designated areas. The Right of Public Access is not applying here as such camping is governed by off-road vehicle use laws.



Take your rubbish with you home.

Glass, tins, plastic bags and bottle caps can injure both people and animals. Therefore, never place a rubbish bag next to a full dustbin.
